





Exhibit 1-1: PIT Estimates of People Experiencing Homelessness by Sheltered Status, 2007-2024

Homelessness jumped in 10 Michigan counties. What's being done about it?

Updated: Feb. 19, 2024, 1:13 p.m. | Published: Feb. 19, 2024, 8:42 a.m.

Our region saw homelessness increase by 56% from 2021 to 2022 going from 940 to 1,471 people.



Our 56% increase biggest jump in the state: 47% in the Upper Peninsula, 31% in the Detroit area, 21% in West Michigan



The bulk of the increase came from five rural counties: Wexford, Missaukee, Manistee, Charlevoix and Emmett accounting for roughly 270 people experiencing homelessness





MMU 2024 Statistics

Our Street Medicine Team cared for 580 unique individuals in 2024 88 People received behavioral health interventions through MMU

ED Utilization

CDC estimates for every 100 unhoused people there are 300 ED visits per year compared to 40 per year for housed patients

During the first year of our MMU there was a 76% reduction in high ED utilization among frequent ED users


